The Museum is delighted to celebrate VCQ's 30th anniversary with an exhibit of the wonderful quilts that have been created as gifts for the past presidents of VCQ. 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The roar of

motor cycles around Harrisonburg and the Quilt Museum on June 26, 27 & 28 announced the Virginia Harley-Davidson Owners Group organization rally in the Valley! Places for the riders to stop included the museum. Museum volunteers Janet Saulsbury, Mary Farrell, Debbie Boyer, and John and Phyllis Kattwinkel created a raffle quilt with a motor cycle theme especially for the rally. The raffle raised about \$2,000 for the museum.

Also this summer the online Little Quilt Auction earned about \$1,500 and Court Day, when members of the Board of Directors were locked in jail and pleaded for bail money, brought in almost \$4,000.

We are grateful to all the volunteers who worked an enormous number of hours to raise funds to cover a small part of the expense of keeping the old museum building repaired, the quilts cared for and the museum staffed. Consider that utilities average almost \$1,000 a month and you will understand the constant need for funds.

The Virginia Quilt Museum was founded in 1995 and exists to celebrate quilting in Virginia. The Museum is a 501(c)3 non-profit funded solely through private donations, memberships, and revenue from admissions and museum shop sales. The Virginia Quilt Museum receives no federal or state funding.
