Program Information by Bette Stubbs

September

Today's program features **Connie Broy**, nationally known teacher, quilter and designer from the Winchester, VA area. Connie has invented the innovative Spin Ruler, which she uses to create interesting quilt patterns. The Spin Ruler was featured in the spring 1997 issue of "America Quilter Society" magazine. Her "Star Wars" quilt was featured in the "Miniature Quilt" magazine, December 2000 issue. Her "Indian Radiance" quilt was in the 2002 Quilt Art Engagement Calendar.

In the morning Connie will be teaching a workshop on camouflage patchwork and giving a trunk show at our afternoon meeting.

October

Melissa Hazy will provide a hands on program entitled "Crazy Wool Patchwork" and teach us how to embroider on wool. Melissa will be showing us some of her own wool embroidery, similar to crazy quilts. These stitches can be done on wool, cotton, silk and linen. We will be making a small project during the meeting. With the winter months approaching, many of us will be working with wool for table runners, placemats and other decorations.

Here is a supply **list of items you need to bring** to the October meeting: scissors, regular sewing needles and thread, needle threader, pins, hoop (optional), thimble, large eye embroidery or chenille needles (18/22). If you have wool yarn that you wish to bring, please do!

A kit with the **following items will be supplied**: felted wool, cotton foundation square, DMC floss, 1 large eye needle and puller (a piece of rubber). A handout will also be provided for you at the meeting.

November

This month is designated "Show and Tell" month. Members will bring their quilted items and many will relate their stories. More info will be provided next month.

Guidelines for Workshops

Workshops are special opportunities for a small group of people (usually only 20) to have instruction from a guest teacher. Please follow these guidelines when signing up for a workshop.

- * Sign-up will begin at 12:30 at the guild meeting in the month announced for the workshop sign-up. Only people who have signed-up AND paid can attend the workshop. You are not considered "signed-up" until you pay your money!
- * If you are unable to attend the guild meeting at which the sign-up occurs, have a friend sign you up and pay your money. We will **NOT** be taking phone sign-ups before this time.....Please don't ask us to break this rule.
- * Once the workshop is filled, a waiting list will be formed. If someone drops out of the class, the next person on the waiting list will be called. Please do not by-pass the waiting list by selling your spot to a friend. It is not fair to those who have been put on the waiting list.

BOOK REVIEW: by Pamela Skilton

MAKE IT SIMPLER-PAPER PIECING

When Anne Ochs asked me to review this book I looked at the title, braced myself, smiled, and said yes. But I didn't wanna do it! Uh, uh. About thirty years ago, six friends, all sewers, decided to form a group to make a quilt for our hospital auxiliary to raffle at the annual garden party. It was such a success that it became a yearly project for us. Success is not always good, though. We were approached by someone, who came to one of our meetings, to ask if we would make a coverlet out of the fabrics she had brought, in a large cardboard box. She would pay us. Cautiously, we examined the fabrics—all satins, velvets, and other slippery stuff—and were appalled.

Not easy fabrics to work with. All of us had made evening gowns and other formals, but at that time those fabrics stained and marked easily. We would need to wear gloves, etc. We could think of dozens of reasons why we shouldn't accept the order.

The design was up to us. But we had to use the fabrics in the box, as this quilt was to be a special gift for an elderly lady who would recognize all the pieces, as they had come from her own gowns. We agreed. Our "client" left and we started to form a plan. Key to this was that we would cut paper templates for all pieces so that we could keep such slippery fabric under control. Alas, my first exposure to "paper piecing". Not that I knew I was "paper piecing".

It has taken years - and this book - for me to accept and appreciate the applications of paper piecing. Yes, it does help with working with slippery or stretchy fabrics, by keeping them firmly together with the aid of the paper, but it also produces greater accuracy, especially at corners and points.

Two things we never had or used in that long ago project were a foundation to lay our blocks on—we only cut the paper as facing - and the glue stick. I think both items are a big help. Even taking care with pins, fabrics can move, and the extra layers of paper aggravate the problem.

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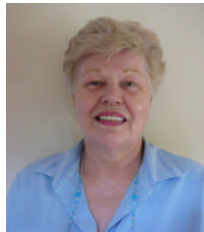
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FEATURED QUILTER OF THE MONTH



BETTE STUBBS

I became interested in quilting after I took a teaching position in eastern Pennsylvania. In the late 1980's I took basic quilting lessons from an Amish woman, learning to cut fabric with handmade cardboard templates, two clothespins and a pair of scissors. The most interesting aspect of those classes was having the opportunity to see the blocks that others in the class had finished with different fabrics. We put our completed blocks on the board each week, and the teacher critiqued each one of them.

After completing these courses, I took classes and workshops at quilt shows, joined a local guild and developed a particular interest in applique and hand quilting. Hawaiian applique was my first and easiest lesson. Baltimore Album applique blocks and embellishment are the most difficult and remain a challenge.

Now that I am retired, I continue to take applique classes from my favorite teachers and can now venture to other states for workshops. I have continued to learn from the members of our guild and particularly enjoy our show and tell sessions.

Glue sticks (washable/non-permanent glue), help provide a smooth, flat surface for machining.

It is a good book, with clear illustrations and explanations. Most of the quilts shown do not have sashing, so it is important to be accurate.

The author recommends three main steps for success. Cut out, but do not cut up a paper foundation, the size of the block. Mark it with the design, fold it into subunits. Cut out templates for the fabric pieces. Glue the corners or tips of fabrics before sewing.

In addition to the "how to" of the book, the preface, history and introduction sections are very interesting.

Look for this book in the Guild Library under "Paper Piecing".

2. When you receive your email, double click on the download (the file attached to the email) and it will download through Adobe (also called a .pdf file).
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
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Buzzings from the Bees by Alma Carter
