QUILT IN A DAY-QUICK TRIP QUILTS

by Eleanor Burns

This is a "how to" book-a very detailed "how to", but do not be misled by the word "quick". "Quick" should not be equated with "easy". It is essential-and Eleanor Burns stresses this-to be accurate and precise throughout the project. Cutting must be accurate. Seaming must be accurate-she provides some hints to help achieve a 1/4" seam. Pressing must be accurate. Once accuracy in technique has been mastered, her method for composing a quilt top, by means of strips, may indeed become "quick".

The "how to" for the Trip Around the World quilts demonstrated in this book is clear and helpful. There are suggestions for selecting fabrics, their placement, and the recommended number of different fabrics for each size of quilt, along with yardage and cutting charts. Guidance is given all the way through to the borders and quilting (conventional machine and long arm).

In addition to quilts with the traditional Trip Around the World diamond layout, there are quarter quilts, (pieced with rows on the diagonal) and landscape designs with applique detailing. This is an encouraging book. I got the feeling Eleanor Burns wants us to try her techniques and make our own Trips Around the World. Accept the need for careful preparation and workmanship-then go for it!

the Elm Creek Quilts series. I am not going to spoil the story for you by revealing the plot, but as the dust jacket describes it, this is "another in a series that neatly stitches together social drama and the art of quilting". True.

Set in rural California, in the 1920's, land sale scams, drought, ruination of ranches, young love, disappointment and hope are all there, as are the quilts, revealing the anguish and love of their makers. The quilts are hidden, found, mended and restored, parts of them recognized, and finally returned to their rightful owners.

Jennifer Chiaverini has written two parallel stories here and tied them together very neatly, with the help of quilting. If you enjoy this book look for other volumes by the same writer. She has a very wide interest in quilting and is also the designer of the Elm Creed Quilts fabric lines from Red Rooster fabrics. (This book can be found in our Guild Library under "Novel".)
