She feels the history of a quilt is important and upcoming generations should have information and history about the person who designed and created each quilt. Her friends laugh when she works on a label and remind her "the label doesn't need to be as long as a book."

June 23—Program (1:00 pm at Halesford Baptist Church)

After graduating from Drexel University in Philadelphia with a degree in design, **Hollis Chatelain** went to Togo, West Africa, with the Peace Corps. She met her Swiss husband in the village where she was assigned as an agricultural volunteer. They were married in the traditional African way and lived a simple village life with no electricity or running water. Their first child was delivered by midwives in the glow of a kerosene lamp. The richness of these experiences has found its way into the art of her quilts.



Since 1980, Hollis has lived most of her life overseas. In Africa, she worked on her quilts in a 9' x 9' studio with only an overhead fan to combat the 100-plus degree temperatures which existed for much of the year. During that time she taught drawing and color to villagers. In Benin, she began purchasing locally produced white cotton cloth that she dyed and painted with fiber-reactive dyes and pigments, expanding the range of her creativity.

In 1996, Hollis returned to the United States. Six months after moving back, her longing for Africa was so great that she started to paint African images to bring back memories of the life she loved so much.

Hollis has had quilts exhibited in many national and international shows. Her work can be found in private collections around the world. She plans to continue make quilts with African imagery to share the joy, harmony, and pride of these people"... instead of the suffering and turmoil we so commonly hear about in the news.


Please come and joint in our Quilting Gala. This is an event you will not want to miss! Ladies from our guild will be demonstrating the following:

- *Prairie Points* (Quick and Easy) - Prairie points make a charming finish, but they require a lot of time and inclination to cut, piece, fold, pin, and stitch individually to a quilt. Luckily, you can get almost the same look with much less work with continuous prairie points. This nifty technique streamlines the cutting and positioning steps for points in a flash.
- *Cording and Piping* - Adding a thin line of color along the edge of the quilt brings a distinctive touch of dimension and definition. Cording and/or piping don't take much extra time or effort and attaching is easy.
- *Trapunto* - A quilter's skill at stitching decorative patterns is frequently more highly regarded than artful piecing, and solid color quilts with fine stitches or intricately worked patterns are often of great value and so rewarding.
- *Flowers with Dimension* - dimensional techniques add texture and further visual interest to appliquéd designs.
- *Flat Hand Appliquéd* - It seems as though everyone either wants to learn how to appliquéd or is already doing it (hand or machine). If you know how to do points, inverted points and curves then you can appliquéd.
- *Quilt as you go* - Wouldn't it be nice to be finished in one easy demonstration? Just think—if you know how to do this, then you could make more charity quilts at home.
- *Binding* - Pieced and appliquéd, basted and quilted; time at last to choose how your quilt will be edged. Think of finishing as one last wonderful chance to enhance your work and make a statement.
- *Flying Geese* - Having problems making flying geese? They're really much easier than you would think. There will be several different methods presented—one of them will probably just the right one for you to use in your future quilting projects.


Whatever you have decided to do for this year's challenge I hope you are having a good time making your small quilt. Also, I hope you are being challenged in a "good way."
