July 15th, 2025 - Fellowship Day





Learn how to make the classic quilt top using jelly rolls. Ginger Brothers will be facilitating this technique using Donna Jordan's You Tube tutorial. The tutorial is linked in the next column.

To sign up you will need to contact the SML/Moneta Library as this class has limited space. This even is open to all Guild members and sewers, but you need to sign up.

Once you sign up, directions and your "homework" will be assigned to you. The best part if you complete your homework, you could have a quilt top done by the end of the class! This is a great gift for weddings or charity quilts.

Charity Report

Thanks to all the contributors of fidget quilts, walker bags and mazes, we presented 21 fidget quilts, 21 walker bags and 16 marble mazes to Catherine Vance from the Bedford County Nursing Home at the May guild meeting. Catherine provided and overview of her organization. Thanks to all for the NICU hearts. At last count, we have received almost 100! And thanks to the quilters who provided 9 quilt tops along with backing to be longarmed. We have ample batting as our shipment was received.

The Franklin County Sheriff's department will be receiving owls that were sewn in prior years. They additionally requested pillowcases. During an emergency removal they would like to provide a pillowcase instead of a trash bag for the child's belongings. Ann Hoar has written directions. See video in the next column for more hints. With all the great work going on, the Charity Committee will be having a cutting session this month to replenish the quilt kits. We've booked the Moneta library on Monday June 16th from 1 to 4pm. If we don't finish we've booked a session in July. We will be selecting fabric from the donations that have been received and cutting/kitting them into pieces for quilts. Please bring your rotary cutters, rulers and cutting mats.

Have Christmas fabric? Consider making some ornaments or stockings. You may recall at last month's guild meeting, Patty Lively shared that the organization helping youth who age out of foster care need Queen size quilts. So see if you can change that twin/full design into a queen size.

The charity committee is working with the board to get labels. Keep on making quilt tops and provide backing and binding material.

As a reminder, our 501(c) requirements require us to keep track of what we are making and what we are delivering. So please sign when you commit to making something and fill out the donation form when you return the project.

Connecting Threads - Recycling and Reusing quilts

Recently, I was tasked with helping a client at a new job at one of the many thrift retailers in the area. This retailer is considered a corporation and that is all I will say, however, the amount of fabric and donated materials that were thrown out for minor issues, appalled me! I was there for three hours and during that time, four 50 gallon boxes were filled with clothing, materials, and hats! It got me to thinking, how can we breathe new life into older pieces and reduce our waste?

- Make a jacket There are several tutorials on how to do this. If you are recycling an old quilt be sure to look out for stains, holes, and rips while laying out.
- Recycle them into stuffed animals. This is a great keepsake for grandchildren.
- Make them into bags. I know we say this a LOT but bags are useful to everyone. I recommend working on bags that stretch your skills in other places to keep yourself focused.
- Cut it up into squares and scrap it into a whole new quilt. The <u>American Quilt Society</u> built an entire exhibit around the resourcefulness of quilters who built their quilts from recycled materials. Click on the link to check it out.
- Fabric Wreaths, Wall Decorations, and Collages- these are a great option especially for quilts that have significant meaning to your family.
